Applying HP Gear Office Pot-Pourri

On 28th November the first major Swimming Carnival for Southern N.S.W. was held at the Philip Pool, A.C.T. Several Olympic representatives participated. As in the past two years, the results were processed by a 9830 calculator with a 9866.

Previously many people were engaged in scorekeeping; with over thirty competitors in some events, it used to be a hassle to determine the eight finalists and also to see who had qualified for Country, State or National Championships. A simple sort routine achieves this and then the results are processed for them all to see within a few minutes of the last heat being completed. Previously publication of results was very time consuming.

At the Castrol International Car Rally held in early 1976, the results were processed by a 9830 installed in Channel 7 T.V. Studios. All penalties for all stages for each competitor were stored for checking. Results to date, or at any stage, were available at a few seconds' notice. This greatly assisted the organisers and media representatives.

The media announcers were commenting throughout the coverage of the rally "isn't it marvellous to have our HP computer working for us!"

In March 1977, the World Archery Championships will take place at Canberra. It is currently envisaged that the targets will be positioned by HP D.M.I. Once again the results will be produced by a 9830.

Two second year University students in Adelaide have organised "The Programming Students Interactive" to encourage as many secondary students as possible to use desk top computers interactively.

The meetings held monthly, are free and open to all secondary school students.

The equipment used at these meetings is loaned from HP.

The objects of supporting this group are many and varied. The gains are good demo programs and feedback on use of new equipment and routines.

The long term benefit is that HP becomes known to a large number of people entering into the work force. These people have a working knowledge of HP systems and HP personnel are known to these people.

P.S.I. has been in existence for three years and it is hoped to continue the meetings after its organisers finish their studies in 1977.

A new application for a multi discipline order has been accepted from a firm in Adelaide. The application is GEO MAGNETIC SURVEYS and the sensors are mounted in a landrover in one instance and in a light aircraft in another.

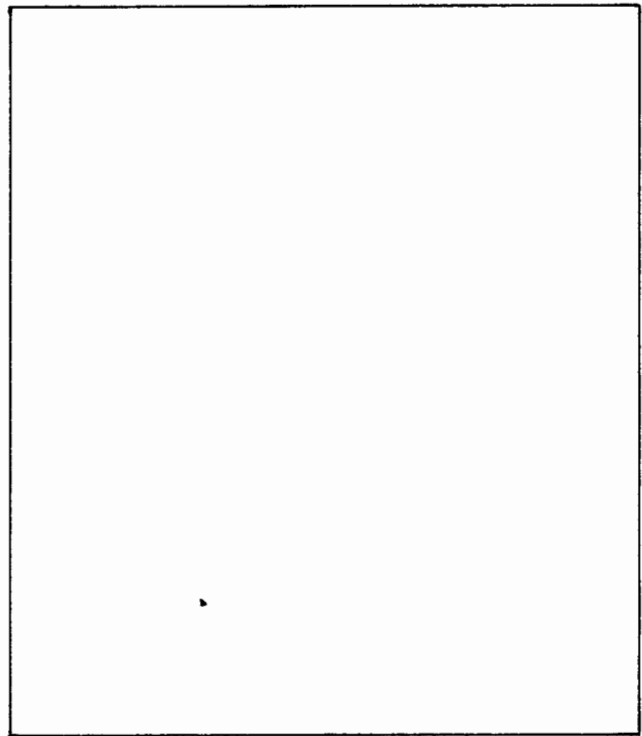

The photograph submitted to "Depth", taken towards the end of the evening, was completely blank. A fair comment on the situation at that hour of the evening, thinks the Canberra writer.



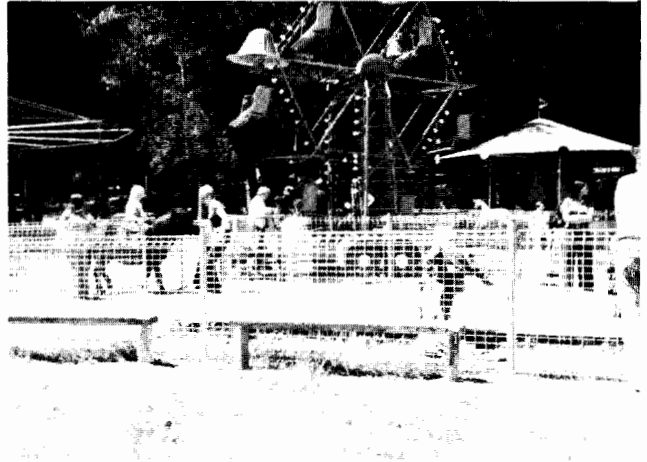

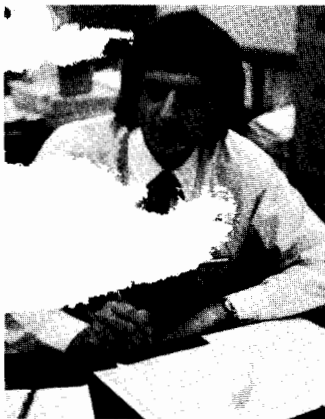
Travellers To and From HPAustralia.

Olympic

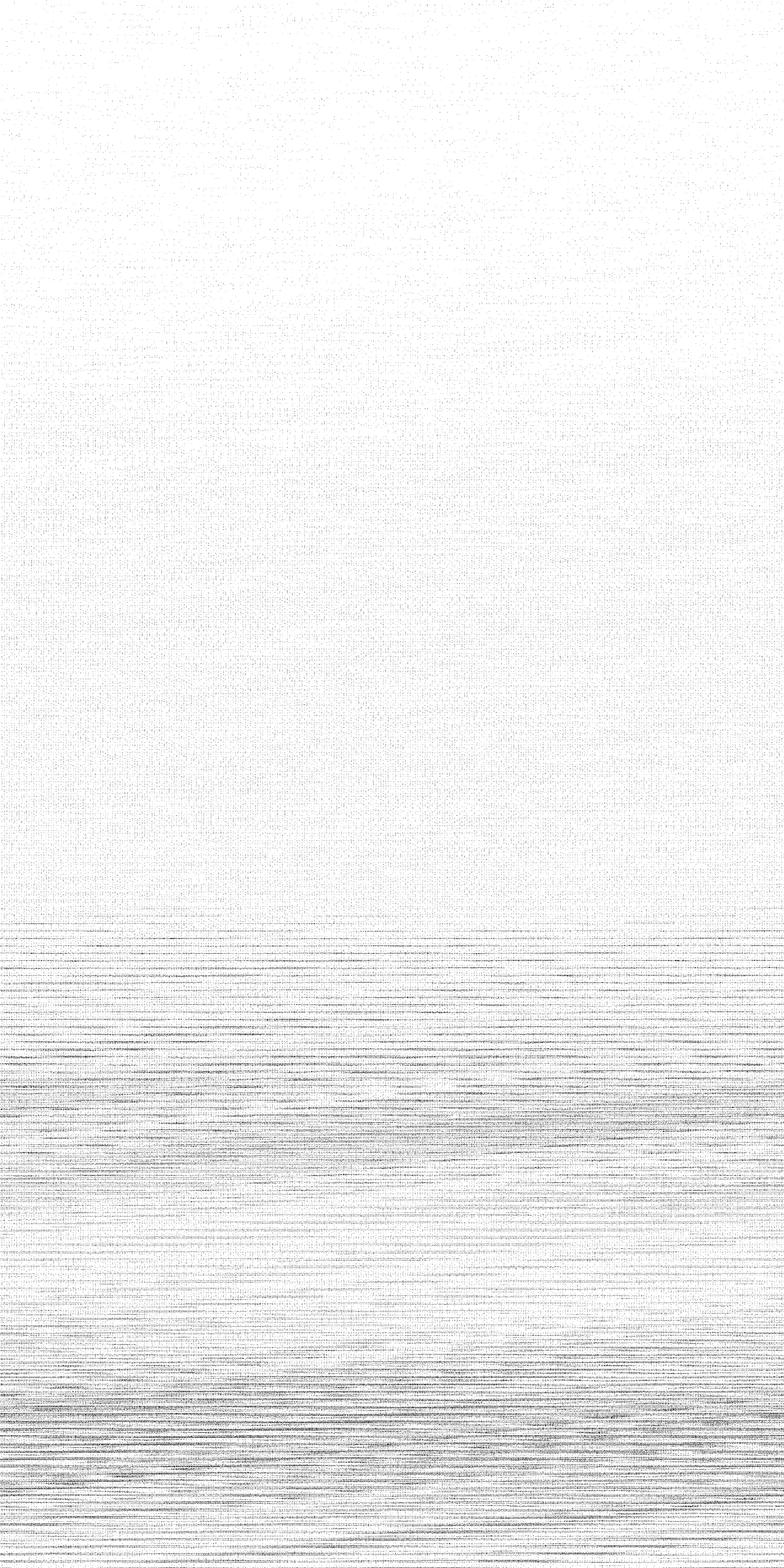
MIKE WOODHAMS, Medical Field Engineer, participated in the 22nd Chess Olympiad which was held in Hajfa, Israel in November.
