

THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF HP'S AUSTRALASIAN HEADQUARTERS

A major milestone was reached in the history of Hewlett-Packard Australia's growth with the official opening of a new headquarters building on April 24th. This eagerly awaited event was held in the new building and was attended by several hundred people from HP's staff, customer organizations and the press, and was the culmination of a great deal of effort by the staff of HP and of Austin-Anderson, the building contractors.

On the afternoon guests were welcomed by the Managing Director of HP Australasia, John Warmington, who spoke of the long association he has had with the Hewlett-Packard Company and particularly of the development of the Australasian operation. Mr. Warmington was followed by Mr. William P. Doolittle, Vice-President and Director of the Hewlett-Packard Company, who had flown from the U.S.A. to be present on such an important occasion. Mr. Doolittle spoke of the tremendous growth the Company had experienced in the period since 1947 when he joined the Company. He also spoke of the increasing importance of international business to the Company and of the role played by the Australasian marketing operation.





By now you will all have had the opportunity of reading the News Release where Bill Hewlett set out the figures showing the results for our first six months of FY74.

The results of course are quite outstanding as compared to the previous year and I am happy to say that in certain areas HP Australia and New Zealand have also pulled their weight in logging good order levels and remaining within a reasonable distance from our originally targetted expense levels. Unfortunately however, there are some areas within our overall performance that require additional attention during this coming six months to ensure that we do live within our targetted figures and I specifically refer to our inventory levels and to our receivables, i.e. the money owing to us by our customers. These two items alone due to our size today can very seriously disrupt the Intercontinental Region figures.

Obviously it cannot be left to a very small number of people to bring these two particular facets of our business into line and it behoves every individual that has some association with either item to ensure that all is done to improve our position in this regard as quickly as possible.

You possibly are not aware of the fact that heavy inventories do reflect in our ability to improve profit share performance. Inventory held in stock that is committed to a customer does not assist our overall profit performance and therefore it's essential that committed stock be delivered to the customer in the most expeditious fashion.
