

Premier Visits HP



On Friday 6th of September the Hon. R.J. Hamer E.D., M.P., the Premier of Victoria attended a luncheon at Hewlett-Packard's Joseph Street offices. Earlier Mr. Hamer was to have opened the Joseph Street building but because of urgent business in Parliament was unable to do so. Mr. V. Dickie, the Minister for Housing, deputised for Mr. Hamer on that occasion, and Mr. Hamer's luncheon visit was in the nature of a social and courtesy call.

Following the luncheon, the Premier made a brief inspection of both floors of the Joseph street premises.

SYSTEMS OPERATIONS REPORT

S.I.C. (Systems Integration Centre) has changed its name to S.O. (Systems Operation Australia).

Since May 1973, when this Department was first formed, S.O. have integrated and manufactured 22 Systems and 25 Special projects, altogether a turn over of \$K800. This is the actual production turn over, not counting the value of standard systems sold, which required specials or modifications.

Ron Davis joined us earlier this year and his prime responsibility is Special products for Calculators/Instruments and associated systems.

In July, 1974 S.O. Melbourne conducted its first Product Training Seminar, led by Bob Brannon of AMD, and according to the feedback from the participants it was very successful.

During May/June of 1974 Ralf Pfisterer visited the U.S. and in particular AMD (Automatic Measurement Division), where he was able to take part in AMD's yearly brainstorming Management meeting, which was held over a two day period at "Bahara Dunes".

Subjects such as world-wide product strategy were discussed in workshop sessions, and for the first time the particular requirements of the Systems Market in Australia was taken into account.

Main subjects were how to improve the role of the Systems Operation Centres in terms of establishing very close links to the factory and the individual departments.

Dave Weibel, Manager of S.O. Centre Germany, was also present and it was very helpful to exchange experiences and discuss common problems which exist. One of the direct results of the participation in this Management meeting was the eventuation of the Product Training Seminar.

THE ANNUAL STOCKTAKE

People marking sheets, others delving into dusty recesses, still other muttering unintelligible lists of figures, supervisors frowning worriedly, sharp-eyed auditors on patrol - the annual stocktake was in full swing. This year's stocktake began on Friday September 27th and the counting of the items and collating of lists continued through well into the Saturday.

To the casual observer the scene was chaotic, but the conclusion was only apparent; in fact a great deal of thorough planning had taken place prior to the start of counting and everything progressed smoothly and on a well organised basis. Co-operation by everybody involved in the stocktaking was again at a very high level and this factor was or prime importance in ensuring the success of the exercise.

THE ANNUAL HP PICKIC

The Hewlett-Packard annual company picnic was held on Saturday, October 12th at Peninsular Gardens near the bayside township of Rosebud. Despite intermittent rain, well over 200 people attended, making this years picnic the largest ever. Fortunately the weather conditions did not spoil the picnic arrangements for the Peninsular Gardens has ample sheltered space for even the largest of crowds.

HP Employees and their families began arriving at the picnic site around mid-morning and thereafter began eating, drinking and thoroughly enjoying themselves. Huge quantities of food and drink were available but the ravenous horde soon managed to considerably reduce them. The cooking was very capably managed by John Warmington, Gray Morgan and Tony Cookes, and the mouth-watering aroma together with the sound of sizzling steaks and "snags" soon had people flocking to the cooking fire. The Social Club has been particularly busy of late.



Whilst we are still involved with the finalization of order quota and expense targets for FY75, it would appear that there is little doubt that as an organization, we will be looking for better productivity throughout the year to ensure that we finish with satisfactory results in all areas.
